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THE COOK'S TABLE
 OF
 WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

By which persons not having scales and weights at hand, may readily measure the articles wanted to form any recipe, without the trouble of weighing. Allowance to be made for an extraordinary dryness or moisture of the article weighed or measured.

WEIGHT AND MEASURE.

Wheat flour,	one pound is	one quart.
Indian meal,	one pound, two ounces, is	one quart.
Butter, when soft,	one pound is	one quart.
Loaf sugar, broken,	one pound is	one quart.
White sugar, powdered,	one pound, one ounce is	one quart.
Best brown sugar,	one pound, two ounces, is	one quart.
Eggs,	ten eggs are	one pound.
Flour,	eight quarts are	one peck.
Flour	four pecks are	one bushel.

LIQUIDS, ETC.

Sixteen large tablespoons full are	half a pint.
Eight large tablespoons full are	one gill.
Four large tablespoons full are	half a gill.
Two gills are	half a pint.
Two pints are	one quart.
Four quarts are	one gallon.
A common sized tumbler holds	half a pint.
A common sized wine glass	half a gill.
A teacup is	one gill.
A large wine glass is	two ounces.
A tablespoon full	half ounce.
Forty drops are equal to a	one teaspoon full.
Four teaspoons full are equal to	one tablespoon full.
